In Memorium Pat Klopfenstein

Virtual inspiration and founder of the Marion Heritage Center, Pat Klopfenstein, passed away on Sunday, May 21st, at the age of 91. The long-serving "First Lady" of Marion, Pat was recognized year after year for her many

contributions to the community as a volunteer to numerous groups and causes, from the Food Pantry to the Friends of the cemetery. In 2011 she was named Marion Citizen of the Year by the Marion Chamber of



Commerce. The Klopfenstein Amphitheater at Lowe Park was named in honor of Pat and her husband, Vic.

Pat's enthusiasm for the history of Marion is demonstrated by the nearly 100 volume collection of records, newspaper accounts and agendas to be found in the Pat Klopfenstein Library at the Heritage Center.

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WELCOME HOME SOLDIER!



Ithough restoration of the Union Soldier statue damaged in the 2020 derecho was not a project of the Historical Society, two of our board members. Erik Miles and Jay Kacena were invited to serve on a Parks Department committee to consider his future.


As commemorated by the plaque attached to the base on which he stands, the statue was placed at its present site by the Women's Relief Corp in 1914. With 109 years of service under his belt, an early decision of the committee was made to replace or repair the landmark if at all possible within a budget based on a limited insurance offer. According to an 1882 catalog of the its manufacturer, the Monumental Bronze Company of Bridgeport, CT, the statue, entitled simply, "An American Soldier," had a list price of \$1,500. Replacement was ruled out immediately (\$40,000) and repair seemed likely impossible because of the limited availability of metal worker/artists with the expertise to do the job. Finding anyone with the experience and skill to repair monuments of "zinc" or "white bronze" is difficult but after several months and negotiation, a craftsman with the ability and the motivation to restore our monument WAS found ... in Mississippi! At one point we even proposed to meet him halfway to save on shipping!



Ultimately, it was innovation and volunteers, working with the Parks Department that made it possible: What could we do ourselves to make it happen? Last October our soldier came back – but not before his restoration was complete. Thanks to the generosity and craftsmanship of Wade's Auto Collision here in Marion, the finishing touch was applied to perfection in weather resistant paint. Thanks to Barnes Manufacturing for engineering advice and Coonrod Crane Service of Cedar Rapids for lifting the 800 pound finished product back to his pedestal in City Square Park.

VOICES FROM THE PAST

The Honorable William Smyth



It's 1845. IMAGINE, if you can, a trip to the frontier – IOWA – at the age of 21; admission to the bar following two years of study and by passing an examination at which both you and the committee are sitting on a log outside a cabin two miles from the town of Vinton! A year later, in 1848, you become the first Linn County Attorney and in 1853, Judge of the Fourth District Court.

A "meteoric rise"? In fact, the entire life of William Smyth was meteoric: he was laid to rest in Oak Shade Cemetery at the age of 46 years and 270 days. The chapters of his story between the law and his business interests, include his famous home that became St. Berchman's School for Boys, Civil War leadership and his election to the U.S. Congress.

The record of Colonel William Smyth as commander of the Thirty-first Iowa Infantry is contained in a volume on his history in the Pat Klopfenstein Library. It details his involvement at Vicksburg, Lookout Mountain, Atlanta and Savannah. In two years of fighting two thirds of Col. Smyth's troops were killed while he, himself, contracted dysentery, which eventually led to his death.
